How can such a commonly used medication be so problematic? A previous advisory on acetaminophen was issued on July 9. Be sure to ask your pharmacist. Speak to your doctor about how any drug interactions are being managed or should be managed. Luckily, most overdoses with acetaminophen are treatable with minimal lasting damage. Acetaminophen is a frequent cause of accidental poisoning for infants and children. Chronic excessive use of alcohol may increase the risk of liver damage due to acetaminophen, even when acetaminophen is used at normal doses. The Flu and Medical Conditions. Also, children less than 12 years of age need to use lower doses, and people with liver problems may need to use a lower maximum dose or avoid using the product entirely. Get emergency medical help if you have any of these signs of an allergic reaction: hives; difficulty breathing; swelling of your face, lips, tongue, or throat. Stop taking this medication and call your doctor at once if you have a serious side effect such as: nausea, upper.
