Levothyroxine is sometimes referred to as l-thyroxine, L-T4 or synthetic T4. If you have symptoms, talk to your doctor about having your thyroid levels rechecked to ensure that you are not experiencing potency fluctuations due to different product potency. While a generic drug has the same active ingredients as a brand name, the FDA states: Each company's formula for a particular dosage of levothyroxine tends to be consistent, so if drugmaker A's product is usually 96 percent, it will typically consistently run at about 96 percent potency. Again, because of differences in potency and inactive ingredients, you may respond differently to that medication. For example, an allergy or sensitivity to inactive ingredients in one generic versus another, or in a generic versus a brand-name drug, can affect how you respond to a drug. A: Synthroid, Levoxyl, Levothyroid, and Unithroid are the brand-name forms of thyroxine currently marketed in the U.S. In addition, there are several different generic versions of thyroxine on the U.S. market. The U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) considers most of these preparations to be equivalent to each. This study is an unblinded, randomized controlled cross-over study, which involves taking 2 different forms of levothyroxine sequentially over a 16 week period. Subjects will have a total of 3 visits over this time period. At the first visit, subjects are randomized to receive either generic (Sandoz) levothyroxine or Synthroid. The difference in circulating thyroid hormone and TSH might have been even greater had we compared BX-rated. Yes, there are several generic versions of Synthroid available in the United States. Many of the generic versions currently available are now essentially equivalent to Synthroid. However, even small differences in the amount of levothyroxine can be important when it enters the body, so it is best to try to stay with the same.
