

# clomid pharmacology

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Clomifene can lead to multiple ovulation, and hence increasing the risk of twins. Signs and symptoms of overdosage as a result of the use of more than the recommended dose during clomifene therapy include nausea, vomiting, vasomotor flushes, visual blurring, spots or flashes, scotomata, ovarian enlargement with pelvic or abdominal pain. In comparison to purified FSH, the rate of ovarian hyperstimulation syndrome is low. Clomifene initiates a series of endocrine events culminating in a preovulatory gonadotropin surge and subsequent follicular rupture. It may compete with estrogen for estrogen-receptor-binding sites and may delay replenishment of intracellular estrogen receptors. This initiates steroidogenesis and folliculogenesis resulting in growth of the ovarian follicle and an increase in the circulating level of estradiol. Used mainly in female infertility due to anovulation e. Based on early studies with 14 C-labeled clomifene, the drug was shown to be readily absorbed orally in humans. The toxic dose in humans is not known. Clomifene is capable of interacting with estrogen-receptor-containing tissues, including the hypothalamus, pituitary, ovary, endometrium, vagina, and cervix. The first endocrine event in response to a course of clomifene therapy, is an increase in the release of pituitary gonadotropins. In some countries, it is also registered for use in men. Following ovulation, plasma progesterone and estradiol rise and fall as they would in a normal ovulatory cycle. Clomifene previously clomiphene is an orally administered, non steroidal, ovulatory stimulant that acts as a selective estrogen receptor modulator SERM. There may be an increased risk of ovarian cancer, and weight gain. Toxic effects accompanying acute overdosage of clomifene have not been reported. Clomifene, also known as clomiphene, is a medication used to treat infertility in women who do not ovulate. This includes those who have polycystic ovary syndrome.
