According to the FDA, there are at least three companies making generic levothyroxine, including Lannett, Mylan, and Merck. The manufacturing process of a generic medication as well as any ingredients that trigger an allergy or sensitivity can make one medication less bioavailable to you than another. Generic drugs are considered bioequivalent to the brand name drugs, meaning that they need to have the same therapeutic effect. But they do not have to have the same bioavailability. They are supposed to be inert, but they can affect how the drug works for you. Understand that if your Free T3 is not optimized, or if elevated Reverse T3 is present or both you very likely may benefit from the addition of a T3 medication to your levothyroxine treatment.
